We were able to relocate all the residents from Fairmount Nursing Home safely and transfer all the team into our other nursing and care homes. We are confident that Czajka Care Group is now 'fit for the future'.

The snap election in July has changed our government. As Chair of the Bradford Care Association (BCA) and working closely with the BCA's board, we continue to try and convince the new government that social care is an important part of our society. Social care is essential because it's about how people live their best lives despite the challenges of having health conditions. Every day social care transforms lives, supports people and is a significant contributor to the economy.

Diligent design at the heart of all Czajka Care Group's homes



Over the last 41 years Czajka Care Group has grown and developed to become West Yorkshire's leading care provider, as well as a renowned provider of quality retirement homes in Nab Wood and Steeton. During that time, one man who has played a big part in the design of all Czajka Care Group's properties is architect, Philip Mawson.

Philip sadly passed away on 7th December 2020 and this story will hopefully commemorate his wonderful work over the last four decades.

Konrad Czajka said: "I first met Philip through my dad, George Czajka, who was a self-employed plumber and property repairer. Philip had drawn up various plans needed for the planning department for my dad and he and his wife, Marian, became family friends.

"In 1979, whilst working at Leeds City Council, I wanted to build a home for my wife, Jasia and our children on land in Nab Wood, which had been given to me by my dad. I asked Philip to draw up the plans and oversee the build. His personality and sense of humour shone through just when we needed it, as it was a difficult and expensive project.

"In 1983 we purchased Staveley Oaks, in 1984 The Old Gables and in 1986 Birkleas and Philip was instrumental in drawing up the plans for the extensions we needed to build, as well as completing all the planning permission approvals.

"In 1989, Philip and Marian became shareholders in Czajka Care Group and Philip worked tirelessly on the Fairmount Park development, which included Fairmount Nursing Home, Brookfield Care Home, Fairmount Park Clubhouse and 37 retirement houses and apartments.

"At the time there were around 300 objections and 45 individual letters which hit the planning department, and the project was deferred twice by the planners before we finally got the required planning permission. Philip made sure that the quality of the building work was outstanding, and his designs have become wholly accepted by the local community.

"A few years later Philip drew up the plans for the Staveley Birkleas annexe, which included 40 single rooms, with ensuite facilities that had environmental standards well above the norm. The 14 houses at Currergate Mews followed, and as the company architect, his work was never done!

"There is no way that we, the Czajka family, can thank Philip for all those years of commitment and dedication enough, and his passing was a very sad time for all of us. I miss him coming into the office and asking me 'what do I want to be when I grow up'!

"Marian and their daughter Judith are still heavily involved with Czajka Care Group in different ways and the Czajka family also thanks them for their loyalty and commitment to our family business. Philip was a kind, gentle and wonderful man, and it was a privilege to have worked alongside him for over 40 years."

During his career Philip has worked on designs for the Bradford Law Courts, the Alhambra Theatre and St George's Hall. Marion said: "He was a very considered man who liked his designs to fit in with their surroundings and connect to the wider environment around them. He created so many beautifully hand drawn plans over the years for Czajka Care Group, which I gave to Konrad when he passed away."

Konrad added: "All Philip's designs have stood the test of time and he also created the most recent plans for our multi-million-pound extensions at Currergate Nursing Home and Brookfield Care Home, as well as the eight stunning new retirement homes at Fairmount Park. We are grateful for all his creative and diligent efforts, which have enabled us to build so many beautiful homes and lead the way in terms of care and nursing provision in such welldesigned surroundings."

Caring Carolyn celebrates 32 years at Czajka

Carolyn Beecroft is retiring after joining Czajka Care Group 32 years ago after a chance conversation with her neighbour, Yvonne Robinson, who was the manager at Fairmount Nursing Home at the time. Carolyn has worked in several roles since she started in 1982, and she's felt fulfilled in each one.



Carolyn said: "I had young children when I first spoke to Yvonne, and I wanted to be there for them but also do something fulfilling for myself, which is when Yvonne suggested a night care role. For five years I worked nights at Fairmount Nursing Home and Staveley Birkleas which used to be called Staveley Oaks - where we cared for older residents with dementia and Alzheimer's."

Carolyn soon proved to be a highly capable and valuable member of the team and as her children got older, she started working day shifts and was promoted to senior carer. Carolyn added: "One of the reasons I have loved working at Czajka and stayed for so many years is the variety of roles I have worked in. As well as being a carer, I've been a physiotherapy aid, manned the reception at weekends and worked as an activity co-ordinator. In recent years, I have worked on a one-to-one basis with residents at Staveley Birkleas, caring for younger adults with disabilities. I've built so

many fabulous relationships with the people I have cared for and the people I have worked with over the years, and they have all become a big part of my life.

"Every role I've had over the years has been fulfilling. It's important to understand that every day, whatever job you do in a care home makes a difference. You really are having a positive impact of people's lives - each shift enables you to change someone's life for the better and that's why working in care is so rewarding. Of course, it can be hard work physically and mentally, and when you lose a resident it's terribly sad, but it's the people you work with that make it so worthwhile. I've made friends for life and have promised that I will come back and visit."

In her retirement Carolyn plans to move house, go on holiday and will also be welcoming a new grandchild in December. She added: "I'm really going to miss everyone, and I'm grateful for the experiences I've had over the years. It's never been quiet at Staveley Birkleas, and we have done some fabulous things over the years with our residents, like abseiling in wheelchairs and taking them on holiday.

"It's also been very special working with Konrad and his family. My children and his children all used to come into the homes when they were little and help decorate the Christmas trees amongst other things - it's always been a really family-friendly place to work. Working for Konrad and Irene Jest, who were both so knowledgeable and involved in the day-to-day workings of the home was great, and I don't think there is any place like Czajka Care Group, it's the people that make it so special."

Konrad Czajka said: "Carolyn has been a constant presence in our homes for 32 years and she has really made a difference to our residents' lives. Hardworking, and having spent several successful years in different roles, she represents what a varied and interesting career you can have in care, and she will be sorely missed."



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Forty years together

Irene Jest has played a huge part in Czajka Care Croup's story over the last 40 years. The 76-year-old was one of the original 'gang' employed by Konrad Czajka when he first started out in the care industry, and she has contributed so much over her many years of dedicated service. Irene retired in 2023 and now lives in Idle, but she still makes regular visits to the homes and The Clubhouse at Fairmount Park.



Konrad said: "Irene and three of her colleagues joined our Staveley Oaks Residential Home in May 1983. Before that she was the deputy manager at the Bradford Council run, Whetley Hill Day Centre, which provided day care to young adults with disabilities. At the time Staveley Oaks Residential Home had 18 older and frail residents and Irene still remembers each of them."

As well as Irene, her husband Ray also worked for Czajka Care Group for many years in a number of roles. Ray said: "We've been married for 56 years and have two daughters, five grandchildren and two great granddaughters. Irene was born and raised in Bradford and before moving into the care industry, she worked in the sewing department of Brown Muffs. She then moved to Ridella as a manager for its sowing department, overseeing the training of staff. Whilst there she completed her City & Guilds in Soft Furnishing and Soft Toys.

"She then took a job at the day centre before becoming the deputy manager. When Konrad approached Irene and her colleagues to work at Staveley Oaks Residential Home, they were keen to make the move, as they could see how committed he was to the care sector and recognised that he was creating something special."

Irene quickly took over managing Staveley Oaks

Residential Home and was also instrumental in helping expand the group as it opened The Old Gables Nursing Home for elderly people with dementia-related conditions in 1984, as well as Birkleas Nursing Home for young adults with physical disabilities in 1986. Irene became the senior manager across all three homes.

Irene said: "It was hard work but very rewarding. Also, so many of our residents were pleased to be in a family-run care home, where we treated everyone like family and made sure they felt properly at home. I will always remember one lady breaking down in tears when I offered her a cup of tea, as she said she had lived in three homes before, and nobody ever offered her one – can you imagine that? I also remember another lovely resident who said every night that she might not be with us in the morning – we looked after her for more many years!"

In 1989 Czajka Care Group opened Fairmount Nursing Home and started to build 37 retirement homes and apartments as well as opening Brookfield Care Home – all in Nab Wood, Shipley. Konrad added: "I have Irene to thank for that, as she was the one who spotted the plot was for sale."

Over the many years that Irene worked at Czajka, she has not only helped manage the teams and ensure everything was shipshape and well organised, but she has looked after many generations of the same families. Irene said: "We cared for the daughter and the son-in-law of our first resident at Staveley Oaks for example and that wasn't unusual. Over the years we have cared for many members of the same family who came to us because they knew how well we had looked after their loved ones."

In 2003 Czajka Care Group acquired Currergate Nursing

Home in Steeton between Skipton and Keighley and then started to build 14 retirement properties next to the home.

Konrad said: "During four decades of expansion, Irene was there every step of the way. As senior manager she worked tirelessly to enhance the quality of life for all our residents. There was nothing that she wouldn't tackle.

"She made sure that residents maintained their independence, so if they wanted to get up early or sleep in, it was up to them – she would make sure the team accommodated their wishes – going to bed when they wanted to, eating when they wanted to and making them feel like they were living in their own home as much as possible.

"Always with a keen eye for detail and making sure everything was immaculate – nothing was ever too much trouble for Irene. She also helped sell our newly built retirement homes, opening them up and showing people round on weekends and she was always there to cover any night shifts, when team members were ill for example.

"Both Irene and I remember all



the residents who have lived in our homes over the many years with such fondness – but we do both have a special place in our hearts for those first residents. There are so many stories we share about the wonderful personalities of those that we cared for, and despite Irene now suffering from vascular dementia, we can still reminisce together with the help of Ray, who has always been by her side every step of the way.



"Irene has spent 40 years working alongside the Czajka family and we are forever in her debt. As well as Irene and Ray both working with us, their daughters, Sarah and Susan, have also worked with us at different stages in their lives, and every member of their family is very caring and capable – it's in their genes!

"We would never have achieved the success and outstanding reputation without the loyalty and massive commitment Irene has showed throughout her working life and we wish her and Ray a long and happy retirement. Her illness is something both she and Ray have found hard, but it brings joy to my heart to see them here at The Clubhouse every week – with Irene enjoying a regular swim and calling in to say hello to residents who she used to look after."

wonderful people to live their lives with dignity."


Dawn's role now involves administration duties, processing company invoices, payroll and assisting with recruitment and human resources.

We provide all the wool and knitting needles, and we soon realised what keen knitters Jean and Pauline are.

"We are always looking at ways in which our talented residents can support the local community, and we thought linking up with Bradford Royal Infirmary would be a great project. We talked to Jean and Pauline about our idea, and they were very keen to rise to the challenge.

"We know people who work at the hospital, and they explained that they always need bonding squares, bonnets and blankets, so we got to work!"

Jean, who is originally from Nab Wood, moved into Brookfield Care Home last year. She said: "It's lovely to come back to Nab Wood after living with my daughter in Mexico. I used to be the head secretary and bursar at Belle View Girls School, so I didn't have much time to knit in those days but since retiring I have always enjoyed knitting. It's nice to be a part of the knit and natter group and Pauline and I started work on the things for the hospital in October."

Pauline has lived in Nab Wood for over 20 years. She initially moved into Czajka Care Group's retirement homes at Fairmount Park before moving into Brookfield Care Home in 2022. Pauline said: "I used to work for the fashion brand Gratton before retiring and have family that I often knit for. When Andrea talked to Jean and I about the babies at the hospital, we both knew we wanted to help. The bonding squares are used to give the babies their mum's scent, but they can only be used once, so they need lots of them!"

Andrea added: "Jean and Pauline have totally taken this on as their own project and been very serious about it. After dinner they often go straight back to their knitting instead of other activities, and we can't believe the number of bonding squares, bonnets and blankets they have made in such a short space of time – it's very impressive!"

Andrea, Jean and Pauline all visited Bradford Royal Infirmary's Neonatal Unit to hand deliver the items. Andrea added: "The team were ever so grateful to us, and it has made Jean and Pauline feel verv valued. Evervone at Brookfield Care Home is super proud of what they have achieved, and Jean and Pauline have enjoyed the whole project so much they plan to keep going! We are therefore going to hopefully be working with Airedale Hospital to do something similar. We are also in talks with Bradford Royal Infirmary to see if Jean and Pauline can volunteer at the hospital, as they are both very able and enjoy helping."
